FROM OUR CHAPLAIN

"Unless the Lord builds the house, the builders labour in vain" Psalm 127 v 1

2020 has certainly been a year of challenges not least because of the impact of the Covid pandemic on us all, our Street Angels project has adapted, sometimes on a weekly basis and even closed while under tier 4 restrictions. A couple of our Volunteer Chaplaincies ceased for a period while others opened. Community Angels moved to the end of a phone. There has been a substantial increase in demand for this service which has grown further since face to face meetings have become possible again. The staff team resolutely worked from home but were pleased to return to the office when circumstances permitted. We have much to be thankful for.

We have now launched our first GP Chaplaincy in Guildford. After a lot of preparation and with the invaluable support of a newly retired GP we are up and running. Staff and patients can book in and have a safe space to be listened and supported in. We imagine the demand for volunteer chaplains will increase as different workplaces recognise the need for this kind of support as we emerge from Covid lockdown.

There has been widespread endorsement for GTCC as we work alongside other agencies in Guildford. In 2020 Street Angels were awarded the Mayor of Guildford Award for Service to the Community as well as winning the Surrey and Hampshire Biz Award for Charity and Social Enterprise. In 2021 our Community Angels work was recognised by also receiving the Mayor of Guildford's Award for Service to the Community.

In February 2020 in partnership with Guildford Borough Council we headed up a Faith forum on Homelessness. Over ninety people gathered at the council offices to share knowledge on how the Guildford community is networking to support those who are homeless or face homelessness. Representatives from the police, local GP practice, Guildford Borough Council homelessness and housing department's, HOST and Riverside spoke to the meeting and then there was an opportunity to ask questions and work in break out groups, with the aim of raising effectiveness from a more collaborative response.

At Christmas GTCC took a lead with others to produce an advent promotional virtual service for 'Real Change' A fund that supports people who are homeless by paying for items they need - such as a deposit for a home, a training course, clothes for a job interview to help people build their lives away from the streets.

For first time in our history, we were unable to hold our annual Commissioning service to celebrate and send out our volunteers to serve the community. For those who have not been formally welcomed we hope to be able to do this on 7th November 2021 at Guildford Baptist Church.

COMMUNITY ANGEL NEWS

Lockdown has been undeniably hard for people struggling with loneliness and social isolation. Community Angels saw an unprecedented growth in demand for our befriending service during 2020, with referral rates rising more than 300% during the first months of the pandemic. We launched our telephone befriending service last March, to maintain relationships with our existing clients and to provide rapid-onset support to anyone overwhelmed by lockdown and the associated challenges of loneliness and isolation. Little did we imagine then that we'd still be primarily supporting by phone twelve months later!

We are deeply grateful for the flexibility and positive spirit shown by our volunteers as they adapted to this new style of befriending and took on additional clients. Over the spring and summer, off-duty Street Angels, Samaritans, and others whose usual activities were suspended helped our regular volunteers meet the growing demand. We typically offer befriending support for six months, but during the pandemic this timescale has been flexible: in many cases we have not brought relationships to a close while there has been no opportunity to engage clients with further activities or sources of support. This has been a period of maintenance rather than positive change for many: throughout the year we have done what we can to boost morale, help clients to structure their days and weeks, and demonstrate that someone out there cares for them and their welfare.

The temporary relaxation of restrictions did allow volunteers to resume face-to-face befriending where appropriate in the late summer and autumn, while telephone support continued for others. Community Angels found opportunities to befriend on doorsteps, through windows, in gardens and out in the open air wherever possible. November saw another suspension of in-person support, but since April 2021 we have gradually been able to start the process of resuming face-to-face befriending.

2020 was also a year of staff changes. Rachel Guilford, the Community Angels founding coordinator, moved away in July and Anne Thornton, the former project support

coordinator, moved away in July, and Anne Thornton, the former project support assistant, took up the role. In November, we were delighted to welcome our new project support assistant, Susanna Hoar, to the GTCC team.

Looking ahead:

We trained 15 new and potential volunteers over zoom in November, and another 10 in February. Our referral rates remain considerably higher than last year and growing, so we give thanks for every new volunteer who joins us. Volunteer support remains a high priority and we look forward to launching our monthly drop-in sessions, to complement our quarterly peer support groups, and give our volunteers the opportunity to meet in person after such a long period of remote working.



At the end of last year, we laid the groundwork for our first 'Hub' collaboration with a local church. The St Saviour's Hub was launched at the start of February 2021 and provides an opportunity to match volunteers from the congregation with those in need living near to the church, and to nurture connections between Community Angels within the church community. We hope that this will be the first of many such partnerships.

Above all, we look forward to the warmth of companionship, to time spent with others and to relationships which will support and empower our clients as they adapt to life beyond lockdown.

STREET ANGEL NEWS

2020 began with an influx of new uniforms which were generously paid for by Surrey County Council – a much needed and graciously received gift as many of our Angels had been sporting the same uniform they had received upon joining – for some, 12 years! None of us were prepared for the effects of COVID-19 and having been uninterrupted in our patrols since 2008, it was sad to have to suspend our services for so many months. However, our volunteers responded to the stop-start of lockdowns and adapted our working methods to suit the new demands. As food & drink venues started operating again, we returned to the streets of Guildford in July and with slightly smaller teams to reflect shorter venue opening hours.

Despite these challenges our Street Angels have shown incredible agility in implementing new procedures and consistently kept each other and members of the public safe in these uncertain times. The wearing of facemasks may have been a barrier in one sense but nevertheless the calming presence of the Street Angels was still felt as it was no hindrance to the warm compassion generated by our volunteers.

The landscape of the night-time economy in Guildford has changed significantly in response to covid restrictions, with people generally leaving the town centre earlier than normal. With customers having to book in advance to get into venues, our volunteers were there to help dispel frustrations and encourage patience amongst those congregating on the streets. The Police and Security Marshalls were always quick to disperse large groups and where needed, respond to any anti-social behaviour that followed. We were able to support their work and provide first aid or other assistance where needed.

Traditionally Street Angels act as a trusted contact for the homeless however during lockdown most were provided with alternative accommodation. Street Angels and GTCC continue to work closely with Real Change Guildford and other agencies, to provide long term practical and compassionate support for rough sleepers, and as the situation returns to normal, we expect our patrols will again be able to provide a vital link to protect and care.

The work of Street Angels continues to thrive through our close collaboration with our partner organisations such as Guildford Borough Council, Experience Guildford, Surrey Police, and Pubwatch, working together to provide a reassuring presence and help give confidence to those out and about. We anticipate that our role in the town centre will be more vital than ever as the wider community adjusts to new socialising norms and heightened anxieties.

Looking to 2021, we are delighted to be making a home at St Mary's Church as a permanent base for our patrols after having enjoyed the hospitality of the YMCA for many years. We look forward to continuing to work closely with our colleagues at St Mary's Church, building on our existing links with the Night Vision initiative.

We are grateful to all our volunteers for their flexibility in reacting to the ever changing circumstances, and extend a warm invitation to new Angels interested in being part of our unique family. 





FINANCIAL REPORT 2020





FIGURES FROM OUR ANNUAL REPORT & ACCOUNTS 2020, FOR
12 THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2020.

In a tumultuous year, we are thankful for the consistent and generous support of churches of all denominations, and from faithful individuals, who continue to provide 61% of our regular income. This firm foundation is supplemented by grant & fundraising income which has become an increasingly important component of our income in recent years. The value of our Community Angels work has been particularly recognized by emergency funds during the pandemic, with most grants received being restricted to this project.

Expenditure at £71k is below the previous year £77k despite the expansion of Community Angels, this is largely due to our Street Angels coordinator being furloughed for several months during 2020. Expenditure is budgeted to increase significantly in 2021 because of growth in demand for our services.

The charity remains in a strong financial position providing a sustainable base for the expansion of our work. We are budgeting for a deficit in 2021 which will be funded from reserves.
