### **Angels make** Towering **Impression!**

One of the highlights of our tenth anniversary year was when on a Saturday in November, our friends and supporters stepped up a gear and helped us raise an amazing £10,500 by climbing the Cathedral tower - over 200 times! But we have so much more to be grateful for over the last decade. During those past 10 years, we have seen volunteers come and go; a total of around 265 Street Angel volunteers some of whom have been with us right from the beginning. We currently have 80 Street Angels (SA's) serving on the regular teams. 31 people have been supported in their homes by Community Angels and 10 Volunteer Chaplains are

#### Interview with Rev Noelle Coe our new Town Chaplain

My name is Noelle Coe, and I'm delighted to have been appointed as the new Guildford Town Centre Chaplain. I've really enjoyed my first few weeks, and count it a huge privilege to have been given this opportunity. It's been good to meet so many new folks. I am excited about all that lies ahead, and am very grateful to all the churches, companies and individual people that support and pray for our work.



#### As Chaplain I work on behalf of all the

Christian churches in Guildford, and have inherited a wonderful team of volunteers who show great commitment to the people of Guildford. For example, our volunteer Chaplains can be found week by week as a comforting presence in the homeless shelter, or a friendly face in our many retail establishments, or at other times liaising with the Police, Local Council or Charities in various community concerns. Our Community Angels initiative was established last year to befriend people who feel lonely and isolated and find life difficult. The Street Angels scheme has been established for many years now, and our volunteer teams are familiar faces every Friday and Saturday night assisting those who may find themselves in difficulty.

Let me share my personal background. I'm an ordained minister in the Church of England and moved to the Guildford area sixteen years ago with my husband Andrew (Team Rector of the Surrey Weald Team), and our three children. We live in the village of Newdigate. I grew up, and went to school, in Walton-on-Thames. After A levels I held a variety of jobs with CWR (Crusade for World Revival), National Express Coaches, Sports Centre Administration, Local Government and Civil Service. During this time I was a Methodist Local Preacher. After my marriage to Andrew we joined the team at St. Martin's in the Bull Ring, and lived in the centre of Birmingham next to Birmingham City Football Club ground in St Andrew's Road, in Europe's first urban village. Later we moved to the Handsworth area, and during this time I was a tutor for Readers Training, and also a member of the Bishop of Birmingham's Liturgical Committee.

Thus, I hope, that my background of inner city, outer estate, and rural ministry, gives me a breadth of experience to bring to the Town Centre Chaplaincy. I also hope that I bring an understanding, and



experience of relating to many people from a wide variety of backgrounds, and cultures, and of different faiths or none. I have a real fondness for Guildford, and feel that it is a very vibrant and outward looking Town, full of energy, creativity, enterprise and learning. To be at the heart of this is very exciting.

Someone asked what I'd do if more funding were available for the Chaplaincy. I would like to see hubs set up for Community Angels, helping us to reach a greater number of people who feel lonely or marginalised. We know the need is out there, but we'd require more administrative help to make this viable. I look forward to meeting all our Angels without whom none of our work would be possible.

## Tower Climb Soars to £10,500

Well we did it, and not only that - more than doubled our target - and the money is still coming in. We are absolutely delighted to announce that between us we have raised over  $\pounds 10,500!$ 

Louise Kenyon, who dreamt up the idea and then made it all happen, told 'Hark':

'On Saturday 24 November a team of 44 volunteers bravely climbed the Cathedral tower to raise money for our 10th Anniversary Appeal: 'Be an Angel'. In total we were aiming to clock up at least 50,000 steps. This figure represents the number of people the Street Angels have helped in their first 10 years of operation, and the number of bottles which have been picked up in the same period!'

We are delighted to announce that we collectively achieved 200 ascents (over 100,000 steps) in the time available, spurred on by so much support from far and wide. With huge thanks to the fabulous team of people who took part, and our generous sponsors.

Rod Boreham clocked up the greatest number of ascents (13) and Rachel Guilford was the fastest in an amazing 3 minutes and 34 seconds.

On the day we were graciously joined by the Bishop of Guildford, the Reverend Andrew Watson, Town Mayor - Mike Parsons and former High Sheriff of Surrey - Lady Elizabeth Toulson CBE (who has kindly agreed to become our first Patron) and she joined other chaplains, ministers and friends.
