The commissioning service was wonderfully led by our fabulous Rev Noelle Coe, URC's minister Revd Wayne Hawkins and PC Jonny Smale from Surrey Police who spoke about how care on the streets and kindness with the listening ear stretches far. We were joined by our special guests the Mayor of Guildford, Councillor Masuk Miah, Guildford MP Angela Richardson, Peter Rudkin, representing Guildford Philanthropy, and other local organisation as well as supporters from partnering charities and businesses. Fundraising News

Over the years, GTCC has been blessed by many faithful churches and individuals who support us financially for which we are so very appreciative. With our projects and staff team growing since 2008, regular giving now only accounts for about 40% of our total income. The balance comes from a mix of generous grant funders, rare legacies, and fundraising events, which is becoming increasingly challenging in these difficult times. Encouragingly, our projects have been recognised by several new funders this year, even though, at the time of writing, we are still budgeting for a planned deficit of some £30k. 2024 will be equally challenging, so we are always happy to explore new funding opportunities – do get in touch via the office, if you think you can help.

I'd like to give a special shout out of some of the local organisations that have supported us this year — Guildford Poyle Charities, The Community Foundation for Surrey, Guildford Philanthropy, TKMaxx, Surrey County Council, the Office of the Police & Crime Commissioners, Tesco's Community Fund, Guildford Cathedral, The University of Surrey, The Assura Social Impact Fund and Guildford Scottish Country Dancing Club — many thanks to all. We could not continue to operate without such generosity. Community Angels team and new uniforms (including some much needed extra winter hats) for our Street Angels – great news, these are really appreciated and will help us deliver our services

more effectively.

Church (see article below). Plans are already underway for a range of special events in 2024, please "save the dates" on page 6 as we really do need everyone's help to balance the books!







GTCC picture album

Suzette, GP Chaplain

Our Volunteer Chaplain's project continues to grow, and we are delighted that we have recently placed our third GP Chaplain in a surgery in the area. Our GP Chaplains are now in much demand, working alongside the health professionals in Binscombe, Dapdune and Stoughton, providing the gift of a listening ear to a wide range of people. Here new volunteer, Suzette, shares her thoughts on her role as a Chaplain.

'To give your attention to someone in need, in pain or in distress is the first step, and sometimes it's the only thing, the only step you can take.... and if you pay attention to someone, you are loving them,'

These words by Fr Lawrence Freeman, sum up how much of a privilege it is for me to be a GP Chaplain allocated to a local doctor's surgery. Listening and being alongside people as they tell of lives, relationships, joys, and sadness. Tears, sighs, laughter often shared after an initial reluctance, verbalised as 'I'm not religious' 'not sure why I'm here', is very special.



As we sit together, I knowing nothing more than their name, it is in the silences, the laying down and the speaking out loud of expectations, fears, dreams that hope is found, the first step perhaps for them to find a way.

A working life in healthcare and a faith which sustains me, is a great foundation for this role, however it's the people. I love people, always have done, their uniqueness. How, wonderful that since the world began, no two snowflakes are the same, and no two people are the same either. Isn't that fantastic! And to be a voluntary GP Chaplain is simply fantastic!'

ROC Angels comes of age

This year the Guildford Town Centre Chaplaincy has celebrated its Crystal anniversary and in those 15 years around 200 people have volunteered through our 3 main projects with many more becoming prayer partners supporters and trustees. But did you know that this year Street Angels nationally is celebrating its 18th birthday and so comes of

age!

Redeeming Our Communities (ROC) Angels is the umbrella organisation for around 100 local projects working within the night-time economy, at major events such as music festivals or within communities across the UK and in America, Spain, Seychelles, Australia and Brazil. In that time they haved helped change a culture with a UK reduction in alcohol related violence and A&E admissions. Indeed it was good to hear from Surrey police at the recent commissioning service that our projects are still reducing nighttime crime as well as saving police time.



The ROC Angels website reflects

"Street Angels - started in 2005 as a response to needs and issues in the night-time economy in Halifax. Street Angels has gone on to be replicated in over 100 communities across the UK and overseas and has contributed to significant reductions in violent crime and anti-social behaviour in



many of the places we serve. Street Angels are teams of volunteers patrolling town centres with a heart to love the person in front of them. Our teams: look out for those are or could become vulnerable; offer flip-flops, low level first aid, lollipops, water; give time for people to chat; work with the Police, Local Authority and pubs and clubs towards a safer and more vibrant night-time place; work within other areas of need and vulnerability such as transport hubs; become part of the wider community through volunteering at community events."

Paul Blakey MBE, (pictured left) the founder of Street Angels, says, "Eighteen years ago the original Street Angels didn't imagine that our simple response to an out of control Friday and Saturday night in Halifax would become a movement of projects around the world.

"People who care, simply loving the person in front of them, is a powerful act that makes a massive difference whether on the streets, at a music festival, in a shop or nightclub through chaplaincy or supporting some of the most vulnerable within our communities.

I am so thankful for everyone who has volunteered and stood with us throughout these last eighteen years."

Street Angel Alistair recognised for 'outstanding community contribution'.

A retired management consultant who swapped the international finance sector for a local volunteering role is the Guildford Resident of the Month for September.

Alistair Pearson joined the Guildford Street Angels in 2017 and is one of over 50 people who regularly give up their time to help anyone in need while out for the night in the town centre. Alistair said:

We complement the work of the emergency services at a time of night when you often have thousands of revellers milling around, some of them the worse for wear due to drink or drugs, or both.

"We provide a listening ear, helping to keep people calm and making sure that they remain safe and if necessary, receive any medical care they may need. "I joined the Street Angels because I believe it's important that everyone plays a part in their community and I hope others will get involved, whether with the Street Angels or another local good cause."

Organised by the Surrey Advertiser and sponsored by Guildford based solicitors DMH Stallard, the Resident of the Month Award recognises unsung heroes who deserve recognition for their outstanding contribution to society. Samantha Jago, partner and family law expert at

DMH Stallard met Alistair this week to present him with a certificate. She said: "As part of his award, Alistair also receives a complimentary meal for two.





Christmas Tree Festival brings Generous Gift

A conversation with one of our longeststanding Community Angels, Julie.



What motivated you to become a Community Angel?

'After leaving my job as a project manager for a local charity back in 2016 to move in with and care for my parents, I experienced loneliness and isolation while being away from my home and immediate family. It was volunteers working with charities such as the Alzheimer's society and MacMillan who made such a difference during that time and helped to make things a little more bearable for me.

This inspired me to find a volunteering opportunity that would enable me to help others who, for whatever reason, were struggling with loneliness. I feel privileged to have been part of the first cohort of Community Angel trainees in November 2017 and since then have been fortunate to support 9 clients.'

Can you tell us about something you have found rewarding?

'The element of the role that I've found the most rewarding is seeing people make changes to their lives that have made a positive and lasting difference. I have really enjoyed getting to know

all my clients and feeling that you're helping is really special.



One example of a befriending outcome that has been particularly rewarding is a gentleman who had become very isolated and depressed after ill health forced an early retirement. Since supporting him he has learnt to make some simple meals, taken up a new hobby to keep tropical fish, joined a gym and achieved some simple goals of gently increasing his activity level. My befriending relationship came to an end recently and it is heart-warming to know that he has connections in the community now and people he can chat to.'

Have you found aspects of the role challenging?

'One thing to mention that I've found challenging is the temptation to want to do things for your client rather than with them. There is a strong natural desire to want to help and while it is appropriate to make the odd call or accompany a client along to a community group for the first time, I have to remind myself that our help is temporary and that our aim is to step away after they have hopefully developed confidence and a greater sense of self-reliance.'

Have there been any surprises for you during you time as a Community Angel?

'A pleasant and unexpected surprise of befriending has been how much I have learnt from my clients and how they have inspired me. To give an example: one client who, despite suffering from agoraphobia and extreme life challenges, was motivated to do some on line adult education and she inspired me to do the same. We were able to share our experiences and encourage one another.'

Do you have any tips for new volunteers?

'If I were to recommend one tip to help new volunteers in establishing their first befriending relationship it would be to concentrate on listening. Adopting all your active listening skills (which you learn about on the training) and encouraging your client to talk using open ended questions, empathy and showing a genuine interest in what they are saying, helps to establish a good rapport that provides the foundation for an ongoing relationship.'

Susanna and I are immensely grateful to all of our Community Angels volunteers for the time and dedication that you have shown to the project throughout 2023 and wish you joy and peace this Christmas and good health and hope in 2024.

Connecting with our Community

We all want a peaceful place in Guildford and a healthy community, where people live and work together in harmony. As we know volunteers are necessary and extremely helpful part for our thriving neighbourhood. People from all walks of life donate their time and effort to Guildford night economy and we have recently started increasing number of people who volunteer for our organisation, which is great news! We feel that people who are connected to the community they are most likely to take responsibilities and commitment to the place where they live.

Our new volunteer Rosie mentioned the following:

"I joined the Street Angels as I'm passionate that anyone should be able to get home safely

without fear or harm, and wanted to do my bit to make the streets feel a safer place. It's a great community to be a part of and I drive home at the end of each shift knowing I've made a positive impact on people's nights out."

In 2022 alone, Street Angels volunteers provided 500 shifts where they encountered 3411 people, they have collected 3181 bottles and handed out 3500 lollies that diffused the aggravation and violence. These actions helped not only Police and other services but generally the people who live and work in Guildford.
