Our Patron and friend, HM Lord-Lieutenant of Surrey, Michael More-Molyneux, read the Old Testament lesson.

Also participating in the event were Chief Superintendent of Surrey Police, Mark Chapman; Deputy Mayor, Councillor Howard Smith; Guildford MP, Zöe Franklin; Peter Rudkin, representing Guildford Philanthropy and our own Chaplain, Rev Noelle Coe.

We were delighted that so many people took the time to join us and celebrate the amazing work that our volunteers do across the streets, homes and workplaces of Guildford. Volunteer Chaplains are very privileged to have been chosen as one of the Mayor of Guildford's charities for this year.

We have been fortunate to work with Charlie Cluff who has produced a film about Volunteer Chaplains. The film was shown at a sparkling fundraising ball held at GLive before Christmas where a tremendous £75000 was raised by generous donors for 7 local charities. GTCC are absolutely delighted that this event raised a stunning £13,000

for our Volunteer Chaplains project. The event was hosted by the Mayor of Guildford, Sallie Barker MBE and Guildford Philanthropy.

Here is Charlie with her thoughts after spending time with us:

Before filming with GTCC, I only had a vague idea of who they were and what they did. I'd seen the Street Angels on Friday and Saturday nights, but I didn't fully understand their purpose. Perhaps, because I'm not particularly religious, I assumed their work wasn't something that would resonate with me.



Talking to Mike about his role as a GP Chaplain was a revelation. Watching him in action at Austen Road Surgery and seeing how people could be brought together at the Clockhouse, gave me a deeper appreciation for the meaningful support GTCC provides. What struck me most was how accessible and inclusive they are. GTCC is there for anyone who needs someone to listen, to provide comfort, or to offer support in difficult times.

Before this project, I might have thought GTCC was only for those within a faith community. Now, I see that they're for everyone, regardless of religious beliefs. Their work is rooted in compassion, care, and connection, and they make a genuine difference in people's lives. My perception of GTCC and the Volunteer Chaplains has completely changed, and I hope more people come to realise that they're there for them too—no matter their background or beliefs.

Community Angels News Autumn 2024

On 22nd October, volunteers from Street Angels and Volunteer Chaplains joined with Community Angels for an evening thinking about 'Bereavement, Loss and Change,' organised by Anne and Susanna and delivered by Mandy East of the Brigitte Trust.

New Community Angel Charlotte shares her reflections on the evening:

'The setting at St Mary's Church was magnificent. It provided such a warm welcome - particularly lovely as I was very new to the Community Angels team. The peaceful environment was so conducive to listening and learning from an informative and educational evening. Mandy was engaging and so easy to listen to. The workshop encapsulated empathetic, holistic and interactive learning throughout.



At the very beginning of the workshop, Mandy had quite startling statistics that highlighted the importance of this training and stay with me still:

- 47% of people surveyed said they were not comfortable talking to someone who has been recently bereaved
- 84% of bereaved people thought others were uncomfortable talking to the recently bereaved

We looked at Bereavement, Loss and Change on a wider spectrum than I had expected or considered before. In particular, the areas of <u>Normal Loss vs Abnormal Loss and Role Stripping</u> - and revisiting important topics such as <u>Effective Listening</u>.

I am very grateful to have been part of the workshop. I attained a much deeper knowledge base of Bereavement, Loss and Change, combined with many positive learning outcomes. I very much look forward to similar opportunities within GTCC.'



And from some other volunteers:

'We all experience loss and grief in our lives - and we all witness loved ones experiencing grief and loss. It was helpful to take time to consider how to care for ourselves and how best we might support our friends and loved ones when grief and loss come calling. I found the dual model of coping slide particularly helpful when thinking about the chaos that ensues in families following an unexpected loss.' Margaret

'I thought that the evening gave me some pointers for listening better, the whirlpool of grief shows that a picture is worth a thousand words and the consideration of roles very thought provoking. It was pointed out that the loss of the smallest roles can have effect e.g. being unable to drive. But I particularly liked the identification of the role as a 'daughter of God.' Bob

Lots of volunteers told us that they enjoyed the opportunity to meet with others in the GTCC volunteering

community – and the cakes went down very well too!

We look forward to further such events in 2025.

Mr & Mrs Street Angel!

Retired couple Wendy and Ray Dunnett reflect on the joys and challenges of being Street Angels.

"The great joy of being out with Street Angels is the interaction with people - especially as we have both been sixth-form teachers. We've had many chats with people wanting to share personal problems and also discussions on a range of topics, both social and, if it arose naturally, religious.

What has been really pleasing has been the number of younger people who tell us that they have learnt about us from RE lessons in Guildford schools and appreciate what we are doing and the huge number of thanks we get for having personally helped individuals or their friends.

There can be frustrations: when we cannot find a way of helping someone or, even more so, when we don't know the outcome of help we have given, especially if the person has had to been taken to hospital. There can also be traumatic times e.g. when we saw a young woman throw herself backwards into the river from the bridge in Bridge Street. Fortunately, with assistance from all the emergency services, we got her out and a report in the next Surrey Advertiser suggested that she had recovered in hospital.

Despite being well into our 70s, we still enjoy the work and gain a lot from it, hopefully giving as much back. It's a real joy to be part of this work!"

This project wouldn't be able to run without 50 amazing volunteers dedicating their time and skills to make a positive difference and the group recently received an Asda Foundation grant to support this important work. Louise, Trustee, said: "This grant will provide essential equipment and uniforms to keep our volunteers visible, warm, and prepared to fulfil their caring duties on their long and challenging shifts as they care for anyone who finds themselves in difficulty. We are known affectionately as the "fourth emergency service", helping people at their time of need, preventing minor issues escalating into significant problems and keeping people safe."

Faye, Community and Customer Champion at Asda Woking Sheerwater, said: "It has been a pleasure working with this fantastic group of volunteers. The Guildford Street Angels work hard though all weathers on Friday and Saturday Nights making sure

Team leader Mike Smith who was out that weekend said, "We get accustomed to seeing many types of fancy dress whilst out on patrol, from zombies to Power Rangers, nuns to skeletons, but it's great that our Angels can bring light to so many who aren't having the best night of their lives as well as celebrate with those who are.

Fundraising Update

The three projects run by GTCC cost around £120k pa to operate safely. We are very grateful for regular gifts that we receive from local churches and individuals, although increasingly we are dependent upon financial support from grants and running fundraising events. Currently GTCC operates with a planned deficit. Readers will be delighted to know that GTCC projects have been recognised by a wide range of funders over recent months, here are just a few of the highlights.

Our **Ambassador Angels** have been supported by Surrey County Council who have generously funded a new laptop, projector, PA system and branded gazebo for outreach and fundraising events.

Our **Community Angels** have been supported by Guildford Poyle Charities, the Office of the Police & Crime Commissioners, and most recently by a tremendous grant from the National Lottery Fund to support this work in 2025-27.

Our **Street Angels** have also been supported by the Office of the Police & Crime Commissioner, Guildford Philanthropy, Charles Russell Speechlys and St Catherine's School. Meanwhile both the ASDA Foundation and Surrey County Council have funded much needed volunteer equipment, including uniforms to keep our volunteers warm and dry as they provide their friendly patrols.

Our **Volunteer Chaplains** were honoured to have been chosen to be one of the Mayor of Guildford's Charities of the Year and to be a beneficiary of the sparkling fundraising "Mistletoe Ball" held in December 2024.

GTCC ran or participated in a number of successful **fundraising events** in 2024 including the Pancake Race, the sponsored Angel Ascent at Guildford Cathedral, our autumn Quiz night and we had a plant stand at the Summer Picnic at the Castle grounds. These events collectively raised £14,600 thanks to the support and energy of so many people. GTCC is currently looking for extra help with running events and working on grant fundraising applications - please get in touch if you think you can help in this important area.

Last year it cost over £120,000 to run all of our three community projects. Outside of our generous church donors, much of our income comes from individual supporters who have set up monthly standing orders with Gift Aid declarations, so we can claim back the tax on their kind giving. Life Changing Story

Street Angels work can vary from the serious to the mundane. A typical night might involve looking out for bottles or glasses that have been abandoned, helping people to get home safely or tending those who have drunk or taken drugs to excess, but most importantly it's powerful stories like one below that motivate us to do things and help others!

"A young man, J told us a couple of years ago a SA had taken time to talk to him seriously about his substance abuse. He told us that as a direct result of that conversation he stopped from that point on. He now feels very positive about his life and foundational Catholic teaching despite the fact his father, D has terminal cancer. D also came and talked with us and thanked us for the work we do. He was aware of his son's previous encounter with SA. It seems they both had their minds changed about how effective or useful the role of Street Angel is"



Living Legends

Most weekends, when our Angels walk around Guildford's town centre streets, or when one of our volunteers visits a home or workplace, many people presume that we are employed by someone like the police, a charity or the council, to do the valuable work we undertake. When our volunteers explain that they go out without renumeration and sacrifice their own time to support vulnerable individuals, most enquirers are 'blown away'. A recurrent phrase Street Angels hear when

operating on our streets is "you're legends" for doing that. Following that they may even get a 'high five' or hug from the individual.

But if you ask our wonderful volunteers what they've gained from their experiences with us, their answers often show that volunteering is not only good for the

community, but can improve your own personal physical and mental health and wellbeing. Volunteering is known to have many benefits. For some it may be new skills and valuable work experience; for others making new friends or the sense of giving something back or connecting with the community in a useful and valuable way.

There is also a sense that by positively contributing to the community you make it a better place to live and work which benefits everyone whether or not you have a need for us. We are blessed to have good working relationships with Surrey Police, PubWatch, Guildford Borough Council and many other local charities. We have also been delighted when senior community representatives, such as MPs, Councillors, three of our Mayors and other local dignitaries have come out with us.

We are so pleased that our 130+ volunteers are making a difference to our community week by week and are grateful they have done so for more than 16 years. Chaplain's Correspondence

Over the years GTCC has travelled on a faith journey. As you will see from this addition of HARK the work has expanded from its small beginnings - where the Christian churches in Guildford wanted to come together and support a chaplain for Guildford. We now have three wonderful projects: Street Angels, Community Angels, and Volunteer Chaplains. Each one reaches out to come alongside people in the community who may need: a helping hand; a safe confidential place; encouragement and gentle support. It's such a privilege to be able to do this, whilst working with so many indispensable volunteers, who give their time so selflessly. We began 2024 with a planned £35,000 deficit, (an amount that is only sustainable for a limited time). Our trustees had the difficult task of deciding whether to cut back on our vital services to the community, or continue with the risk of the deficit. After careful consideration, it was decided to trust God and continue with the expected deficit. I can now excitedly say that 2024 has ended in December with our books almost balancing! Our heartfelt thanks go out to all those who have made this possible, so that we can continue our work. We feel optimistic and 'protected on our journey' starting 2025, even with the challenge of considering another planned deficit, but believing that, with God, anything is possible.

Community Angels celebrate after receiving £20,000 of National Lottery funding



GTCC is celebrating after being awarded £20k in National Lottery funding to support the work of its well respected "Community Angel" befriending project. Zoe Franklin MP was delighted to present a cheque to the GTCC team recently which is a great start to the New Year

Chris Britton, GTCC Chair, says: "We're delighted that The National Lottery Community Fund has endorsed the value of our work with such a generous donation. We will be able to press on with greater confidence over the next two years to continue to walk alongside those facing a mix of very challenging issues, to help them make a positive step change to reconnect with others, so help rebuild broken lives. We are so proud that our Community Angels are making a much needed impact and that

this has been recognized by recently receiving both the Lieutenancy Award for Excellence during the Pandemic and the Mayor of Guildford's Award for Service to the Community".

The new funding is from The National Lottery Community Fund, which distributes money raised by National Lottery players for good causes and is the largest community funder in the UK. The funds will contribute to the on-going operating costs of delivering the project over the next two years, at time when demand is constantly rising.

Anne Thornton, Project Co-ordinator says: "We are absolutely over the moon that we have been gifted this funding at a time of growing need for our services. We receive more referrals than we have the capacity to be friend and welcome enquiries from potential new volunteers to join our fabulous team of compassionate volunteers"


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
